

INTERFAITH SERVICES TO HIGHLIGHT OBSERVANCE OF NATIONAL PRAYER DAY

Three Major Creeds in Country Will Join Today in Program Linking Cities; Violinist William Kroll to Be Heard in Radio City Music Hall's Broadcast

An interfaith service for world peace, conducted by representative leaders of three major creeds in the United States, today will mark observance of Prayer Sunday, proclaimed by President Franklin D. Roosevelt as a national day of prayer.

Linking three cities, voices of the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Fulton J. Sheen, of Catholic University, speaking from Washington, D. C.; the Rev. G. Bromley Oxnam, Methodist bishop of Boston, and Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, of the Temple Cleveland, will be picked up from those cities. The program will be heard here over Stations KOMO-KJR at 11 o'clock this forenoon.

By Bishop Oxnam, the studio and radio audiences will be asked to join in reciting the Lord's Prayer, an eight-voice choir will sing the Prayer and "Lead, Kindly Light." Reading of the President's proclamation will complete the service.

In setting aside the day of prayer, President Roosevelt urged "the people of the United States, of all creeds and denominations, to pray on that day, in their churches or at their homes, on the high seas or wherever they may be, in beseeching musical director, has planned a group of orchestral numbers including "Good Night Ladies," as the weekly old-and-new tune, "Mister Meadow Lark," "Practice Makes Perfect," "Carica," and "Outside of That I Love You."

The Rev. John F. Cronin, S. S., professor of economics at St. Mary's Seminary in Baltimore, will speak on "Leaders of the Blind," when he is heard on the radio at the hour of prayer, from 9 to 9:30 o'clock this afternoon over the N. B. C. Red network and Station KOMO in Seattle. The talk will be the priest's second in a series of three to be given on the program sponsored by the National Council of Catholic Men.

Jessica Dragonette and James Newell will turn the Summer Hour broadcast stage into a flower shop at 5 o'clock this afternoon on KVI and KIRO. The hour will feature the music of the quartet, in ceremonies a fitting bouquet, using songs about flowers as sales talks.

Miss Dragonette and Newell also are scheduled for solo features. The popular soprano will be heard in Lehars' "Love Is A Pilgrim," and in the prayer song from "Cavalleria Rusticana," by Mascagni. Newell will sing "Because" by D'Ardelet and "Let's Call It A Day." Linton Wells will give an intermission talk.

Music Hall Offers Tuneful Melodies

Two tuneful modern compositions by William Kroll, American violinist and composer, will be featured on the Radio City Music Hall on the air broadcast from 8 to 9 o'clock this forenoon over Station KJR. Presented by the Music Hall String Quartet on a program of chamber music with Soloist Anne Roselle, soprano, and Henrietta Schumann, pianist, the novel songs will be "Little March" and "The Coacach."

Kroll, a New Yorker by birth and a pupil of the violinist and teacher Franz Kneisel, last was heard on a Music Hall on the air two seasons ago.

Music by the Music Hall Quartet will include the "All Unghereese" from Glazounov's "Novellette" and "Quartet, Opus 18, No. 2," by Beethoven. Miss Schumann and three members of the quartet will present the finale from Gattai's "Piano Quartet." Miss Roselle will sing two songs by Schubert, the Serenade and "Margaret at the Spinning Wheel," and "Cecilia" and "Morgen" by Richard Strauss.

Directing a group of Seattle Symphony artists in Thirty Minutes of Music over KIRO tonight at 9:30 o'clock, Max Dolin will open his program with an "Invitation to the Dance."

Included on the program is a feature medley for strings of "Swanee River," "Old Folk in the Mountains," "Massachusetts," "Barlowe," "Old Black Joe," and "Old Kentucky Home."

The orchestra also will play Bizet's "Minuet" from L'Arlesienne Suite, solo, "Because" by D'Ardelet, and "Villia" by Lehars. The program will close with a special arrangement called "Parade of Great American Stars," and will include "April Showers," "If You Knew Susie," "Some of These Days," "When My Baby Smiles at Me," and "A Grand Old Flag."

Baritone Phil Crane on C. B. S.

Phil Crane, young C. B. S. baritone who recently joined KIRO's staff, will present the composition of a Seattleite during his Tuesday broadcast of "Songs by Phil Crane" over KIRO at 7:15 p. m. "Tears That Fall" is the theme, the music by local music were written by Johnny Forrest, local musician who recently played the number when he appeared in concert with Earl Robinson. Crane's Tuesday program will open with "Quiet," by Wilfrid Sanderson. After "Tears That Fall," he will sing "The Night Is Young," and "No Love Like This."

Hollywood's top drama team, William Powell, Myrna Loy and Don Ameche will raise the curtain on the Radio Theatre's seventh season at 5 o'clock tomorrow afternoon over Station KIRO and KVI.

"Manhattan Melodrama," story of two men and a girl, with plenty of action and heart-throbs is the story chosen by Executive Cecil B. DeMille to mark the opening performance of the full-hour dramatic program.

Re-playing hit roles of the original "movie," Powell will appear as Jim Wade, an orphan who works his way up through the district attorney's office to the Governor's mansion, with the aid of Eleanor, played by Miss Loy. Ameche takes the part of Blackie Gallagher, Jim's boyhood pal and Eleanor's former boy-friend, a New York underworld figure. Jim will portray the District Attorney. Louis Silvers will be musical director.

A balanced program of masterpieces from the classic period of Handel and Haydn to the close of Wagner's life has been prepared by Howard Barlow for his Columbia Broadcasting Symphony Concert. The program will be heard over Station KVI at 11 o'clock this forenoon. The program will feature with Weber's "Overture," Barlow returns to the celebrated "Water Music" Suite of Handel, arranged by Hamilton Harty, and then Haydn's Symphony No. 98. In the final portion, excerpts from Wagner music-dramas will be presented. They are the "Good Friday Spell" from "Parsifal" and Wotan's "Farewell" from "Die Walkure." William Fineshriber will be intermission commentator.

Willis Higley, Station KOL's "Old Sentinel," returns to the airwaves tomorrow after a month's vacation. He will be heard daily Monday through Saturday morning from 6:45 to 7:15 o'clock on the Old Sentinel. In addition to his weird collection of sound effects, western music and boisterous calling of time signals, the "Old Sentinel" has brought back from his vacation trip in British Columbia and Alaska enough fishing stories to keep his listeners awake and doubting for months.

Munn's solo will be "None But the Lonely Heart" by Tchaikowsky. Triste and Elizabeth Lennox, contralto, will sing "Love Passes By" by Scherzinger. Gustave Haenschen will conduct the orchestra in Werber's "Overture," "Air De Ballet" by Herbert and Brahms' Hungarian Dance No. 6.

Arthur Treacher, perennial butler of the films, will be guest star on the Command Performance broadcast at 8:30 o'clock tonight on Station KOL. But tonight he will not play "Leaves." He will "come out of the pantry" long enough to play the role of "Silk," a confidence man, Sing Sing alumnus and professional gigolo in "Milday's Escort," radio comedy by Harold Cantor.
